Independent Living

- Does not need daily nursing supervision
- Manages his or her own activities of daily living
- Coordinates transportation services or drives self

Assisted Living

- Receives daily nursing support for medication and medical needs
- May need daily living companion for support
- May need staff assistance to get to activities or dining
- Staff assistance daily to dress and bathe

Long Term Care

- Nursing staff manages health needs, medications, and treatments
- Needs cueing, prompts, and daily support with activities
- Staff provides daily activities and assists resident to attend

Assisted Living Dementia Care

- Diagnosis of dementia
- Nursing provides daily monitoring, medical assistance, and administration of medicines
- May need secure environment for exit-seeking behavior

Long Term Dementia Care

- Diagnosis of dementia
- Needs secure environment for safety needs due to cognitive decline
- Staff manages wandering, behaviors, ongoing redirection, and cueing

When determining where your loved one will live, be certain to ask about ongoing assessments to assure that he or she is getting the best possible care.

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
